Every February, people across Canada participate in Black History Month celebrations that honour the legacy of Black people in Canada and their communities, remembering and acknowledging contributions and achievements both past and present. The 2025 theme for Black History Month is: Black History 365: A Look Back, A Look Within, A Look Ahead. This theme aims to celebrate and acknowledge past and present contributions and the cultivation of hope for Black futures.

This theme aligns with the **2025** theme for Catholic Education Week: Pilgrims of Hope where we have been invited to rediscover the theme of hope and the meaning of hope in our lives.


As such, the events planned for this month are rooted in the virtue of Hope. We invite educators to lead students in February through an intentional **celebration** of the rich history, contributions and achievements of Black communities and encourage educators to continue to share this learning year round.

February is Black History Month and is acknowledged widely as a month devoted to the celebration of Black stories, contributions and achievements. "During Black History Month, people in Canada celebrate the many achievements and contributions of Black Canadians and their communities who, throughout history, have done so much to make Canada a culturally diverse, compassionate, and prosperous country" (Government of Canada). As a Catholic community, we are called to live in solidarity. Solidarity requires that we learn from, and about our families in Christ. The Honourable Jean Augustine reminds us, "if we are to build a kind of society that's fair and just and equitable and inclusive, I must know your story, just as you must know my story."

Yolanda T. Marshall	Yolanda T. Marshall is a Guyanese-born Canadian Author. The daughter of a Jazz musician, she began writing poems at eight. A cross-genre writer, world traveller, jazz lover and devoted mother, she embodies art and takes her readers on adventurous, cultured journeys.
Khodi Dill	Khodi Dill is a writer, author, spoken word artist, and educator who was born in Nassau, Bahamas and raised in Moose Jaw, Canada. At a young age he found himself writing spoken word poetry and has since traveled extensively to share his work at poetry slams and festivals across the country.

For Elementary Educators: Lesson Plans Available on the Equity SharePoint

The following texts are available in elementary schools along with accompanying lesson plans developed through the Equity Department that are rooted in the pedagogical framework of CRRP offered by Dr. Gholdy Muhammad.



Synopsis: Each page of The Me I Choose To Be is an immersive call for self-love that highlights the inherent beauty of all Black and brown children. Read this text with your class and use the accompanying lesson.



Synopsis: Starting with beatboxes and fingersnaps, an exuberant narrator introduces kids in his community to the powerful possibilities of rap, from turning "a simple phrase/into imagery that soars" to proclaiming, "this is a voice that represents me!" Read this text with your class and use the accompanying lesson.



Synopsis: I Am Perfectly Designed is an exuberant celebration of loving who you are, exactly as you are. In this empowering ode to modern families, a boy and his father take a joyful walk through the city, discovering all the ways in which they are perfectly designed for each other.Read this text with your class and use the accompanying lesson.



Synopsis: This fascinating, full-colour illustrated book features over 50 amazing Black people from Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland and Labrador, sharing their incredible stories and accomplishments, past and present. Read this text with your class and use the accompanying lesson.



Synopsis: In a sweetly appealing tale of overcoming your fears, newcomer Gaia Cornwall captures a moment between a patient and encouraging father and a determined little boy you can't help but root for as he learns to jump off the diving board for the first time.Read this text with your class and use the accompanying lesson.



Synopsis: A culturally rich collection of poetic tributes that extends the legacies of poets from around the globe. . . A magnificent exploration of the poetic imagination. This text is a great tool to explore literary devices, introduce students to different styles of poetry and many world-renowned poets, who may have previously been overlooked. Read this text with your class and use the accompanying lesson.
